PUMPING ENGINE MODEL.

A 1 scale, working model of the Wanlockhead Beam Engine has been constructed by a Chesterfield engineer, Mr F. Jackson.

Mr Jackson worked the drawings made by Mr W, Harvey, and the model is based on the assumption that the engine was a water bucket pump, and worked by the weight of a large bucket filled and emptied.

Pumps of this kind were known as 'flop-jacks' in the Cornish mines. Also as 'Bobbing Johns'in Scotland, in the ISth cent a similar pump worked at the Ecton mine in Staffordshire. The fact that Mr Jacksons model works perfectly provides further evidence that the Vanlockhead pump worked in this manner. The model was on show at the annual exhibition of mining history, and was seen by over 4000 visitors. Mr Jackson is preparing an account of his model for publication in "The Model Engineer".

As the main centre of interest in the society seems to be the out-door events, it seems pointless to fill page after page with committee reports, extracts of the more important decisions are given next.

BOOK REVIEWS

Britains Old Metal Mines, A Pictorial Survey R.H.BIRD

D.Bradford Barton Ltd, Trethellan House, Truro, Cornwall. £3-50 1974 II2 pages I56 plates page size 210 -215mm

As the author states in the introduction, the aims of this book are to put some historic mining sites on record and to encourage others to do likewise.

The content of this book is essentially photographs, together with an outline map to show location of mining areas and up to a page of text as an introduction to each mining area covered. The plates varying in size from whole plate to \(\frac{1}{4} \) page, have extended captions.

The area headings are South West England, The Mendips. Wales, Shropshire, Aldersley Edge. Ectom Copper Mines, The Peak District, The Pennines, The Lake District, The Isle of Man, Wanlockhead, and Eire.

The plates are varying quality; some are of exellent quality but the reproduction process of litho printing has apparently not done justice to some of the prints which appear to lack contrast.

There is an overall impression to this reviewer of 'greyness'. A most peculiar plate occurs of the leat to Dolaucothi mine which shows a mass of bracken, but I am told by the author

that this was due to layout problems. An interesting view of Cwystwyth mill is spoilt by the walls facing the camera being in total shadow and there is a rather grim view of Grassington smelt mill flues. There are some exellent shots, including the of the headgear of Black Tom shaft, some underground in Ball Eye mine and one of an ore crusher in the Wicklow mountains; The author includes location map references for each plate.

CORNISH PARLIAMENT.

The ancient Stannary Parliament of Cornwall is in the threes of revival, after lapsing into disuse in the year 1752.

At a Press conference at St Austall, it was announced that an issue of Cornish Bank notes, in the denominations of,5s., IO., one old paund, and five old pounds was to be printed and issued, the notes would be redeemable with Gold and Silver purchased by the issue. The notes are described as Cornish old language on the front with English translation on the back.

The Good Old Days ?

From the Bradford Telegrph and Argus, Nov 23, 44, by ARGUS. "Describing a journey he made in the Keighley area, August 27, 1750. Bishop Pococke, a noted traveller wrote: When I and my party left Ilkley we passed by the south bank of the Wharfe to Addingham, then crossed the moors to Silsden, to the hall of the Earl of Thanet. The moors we passed are full of coals, and a horse load of 20 stones of 16 pounds each sells for 4 pence, at the pits.

In the early part of last centuary coal prices had increased substantially, and coal mined at Morten Banks was sold at 4s 9p and 5s 6p a ten. About I880 it was suggested a company be formed for coal to be carried from the pit by overhead bucket conveyor line to the Leeds and Liverpool canal, but with the opening of the South Yorkshire coalfields the idea never materialised."

Private Meet Report. Langley Barrony Mine.

Honeycrook Mine Adit. Grid Ref, Sheet, ???. 825 660.

This adit portal is part of some excedingley well dressed stone mine buildings which are worth visiting. The commemorative stone above the perfect entrance stonework reads:

Honeycrook Adit July 1871.

Unfortunately it is blocked I5 yds in..

The square chimmney approx 60 ft high with it8s capping still intact dominates the site with a boiler house 508by I5' below it.

Two slightley smaller buildings alongside complete the engine complex.

A good arched tailrace with dressed stone floor etc, leads to the burn below where the settling ponds were situated. The bingsteads were robbed for stone 5 or 6 years ago.

Remains of the stamps and four good and three poorer stone buddles coplete the buildings apart from some isolated dressed stone bases which may have been at one time some form of ropeway. The spoil tips have remains of some recent floatation plant which have reprocessed the old waste, in the Leadbitter shaft area.

Honeycrook Burn 829 659. in the limestone gorge alongside the old mine road(now a forrest of undergrowth) is a trial level

Joicey Shaft 832 659, Very little remains though the house was obviousley a mine building at one time.

Winnetley Mine; Two levels were found in the rank undergrowth of summer. One 4IO ft to the forehead had acalcite floor for over IOOft of it's length.

Waterhouse Mine. The low level by the river has a flood line 4' high. It is a labyrinth rather similar to the Richmond Copper Mine, (Richmond, N, Yorks) Stringers in an infill of boulder clay and pebble are to be seen. ::: 40 or 50 ft higher on the other side of the main road is another level which appears never to have been very productive as the vein is only of stringer size. Road improvement plans in the future will obliterate this feature.

This meet was a good interesting day out, thanks to Jack Thompsonand his friend Jim.
