Chimney Shaft Excavation.

As you will have seen from the meets card, we have now started digging out Chimney Shaft on Greenhow Hill.

The object of the dig is to try to recover the underground horizontal engine for BRADFORD INDUSTIAL MUSEUM (or failing that to photo and measure the engine) and maybe as a bonus gain entry into the Cockhill Level.

The shaft is blocked approx 70ft. down by soot and ash and general rubbish, and being only 21 61 diameter, it is a slow and steady dig.

The winding is being done by means of a hand windless, the kibble being an adapted 5 gall oil drum.

On the surface has been constructed the Pit Head Gear and a N.M.R.S. Mk I type engine house, containing the winch, as well as calor stove and other de-lux welfare facilities.

Anyone contemplating helping on the dig should be aware of the fact that on Greenhow it is always wet - cold - & windy, - so come prepared.

Another Summer School in Industrial Archaeology is planned for the 17th to 25th July. Course fee, excluding accommodation, is £25. Further details and enrolment forms can be obtained from the Department of Extra Mural and Adult Education, University of Glasgow, 57 Oakfield Drive, Glasgow G12.

During the three weeks following this, i.e. 26th July to 15th August, The WANLOCKHEAD MUSEUM TRUST plans to complete the excavation of the 18th century smelter site at Pates Knowes, using voluntary help, & so that the re-building of a Scotch ore hearth can follow at a later date.

The intention is to have a small group working under supervision on the site, with hand tools provided. A mechanical digger will be used to clear some of the overburden. Although some effort will be needed to clear this interesting site, the emphasis will throughout be on a holiday atmosphere, with those taking part joining in for a few days or longer as they wish.

There will be a chance to recuperate in the Wanlockhead Social Club; and a trip underground for minerals etc is a possibility. Helpers, male and female, will make their own accommodation arrangements, for which local facilities include bed-and-breakfast, Youth Hostelling and camping/caravanning.

A Message from The Editor

Having taken over the responsibility of Editor of Society publications I should like to take this opportunity to make a few observations which I feel are justified at this stage.

I consider the above position to be a very important one, as a Society's work is outwardly judged mainly by the quality of its publications. If these are poor in terms of content and presentation then prospective members and those who already contribute by subscription will become disenchanted and this can only mean a fall in the Society's standards and prestige.

In the past, the Society's Memoirs and Occasional Publications have been in the hands of extremely competant and devoted individuals which has largely been responsible for the good name our Society has enjoyed. I hope to be able to emulate their good examples in so far as editorial work is concerned.

Having said that, I feel it is necessary to add that a journal cannot exist without the co operation of the membership, for it is the latter who make the Society's literature a real and worthwhile project. Therefore please continue with your support by contributing written reports on all

aspects of your work in relation to mining research even though you may not consider they will be of interest to others - it is far better to have a good quantity of material in hand than to be struggling to fill a few pages. If your reluctance to contribute is due to a supposed inability to write, do not let this act as a deterrent since work can readily be made suitable for publication providing that the original is legible.

Whilst on the subject of content, my predecessor Mike Gill, has added "British Mining" to the title of our Memoirs. This, I feel, is a bold and anticipative step to take since this title suggests a 'nationwide' coverage of mining and its history, as opposed to a concentrated study of the more northerly mining fields.

Provided the contents of the Memoirs carry a certain amount of 'nationwide' material, there is every reason to suppose that this step will (or should!) greatly increase the interest value and sales of our literature which, in turn, will enable us to publish at least two volumes (either Memoirs and /or Specials) per year.

It is also desirable to do this so as to give those members value for money who, due to the distance of their homes from our normal operating zone, are unable to take part in our organised activities but still pay their annual subscriptions — I should know for I joined solely for publications issued:

Therefore, if you have undertaken work on, for example, the study of the construction of the Blackett Level, a historical dissertation on Dolcoath Mine, or some underground or surface exploration of Cwmystwyth, Devon Great Consols, Iazey, Snailbeach or similar widely flung areas, write it up and let's all know about it.

We have already been moving for some time towards this end as witness past publications on the Teign Valley, Flintshire etc as well as short articles of this nature which have appeared in the Memoirs.

Regarding the actual production of Society literature, preliminary discussions and negotiations have taken place between myself and professional printers and this has been latterly very encouraging with a quote which must surely be comparable with present production methods (as yet I am not in complete possession of production costs but base my assumptions on 1974 figures). If professional printing is adopted, there are at least two advantages to be gained. Firstly, due to my home being some-what remote from the Skipton area, the number of journeys are reduced to a minimum if printing and binding is carried out in Sheffield and I am consequently able to keep a close liason with the firm concerned. Secondly, and this is only a hypothesis, a professional finish may help to make the literature a little more attractive to subscribers and prospective purchasers. I hasten to add that the foregoing is in no way an oblique critisism of past methods which, up to now, have answered our purposes extremely well.

Time will tell if the suggestions and thoughts contained in the above paragraphs will bear fruit or are merely the ramblings of an enthusiastic greenhorn!
