

## Annual General Meeting: 19th. March, 1994

For the first time in my memory, the Secretary was unable to make it to a meeting; however, his illness didn't prevent him from reaching his word processor and Malcolm had produced an agenda and copied the accounts; these were delivered to the Miners Arms using modern management methods (ie, just in time) by a much travelled Hazel Martell. Fourteen members attended and, in Malcolm Street's absence, Sally Bassham took the minutes. The Treasurer and Editor were able to demonstrate that last year's brave move to increase subscriptions substantially and to publish 3 book - the two Monographs with large print runs - was paying off. The Editor advised the meeting that she proposed to offer existing stocks of British Mining to members at a discount (limited to single copies of each title) primarily so that new members could catch up on the past BMs. With the larger print runs, such sales still represented a reasonable profit.


Thankyou to those who were able to attend the AGM and thankyou to those who have made donations to the Society.



#### Editor's Report and Accounts

EDITOR'S REPORT to the AGM at The Miners' Arms, Greenhow, on March 19th 1994

As you will see from the Accounts, the situation is looking much more promising than it did at last year's AGM and I think that the great gamble with the Society's cash is beginning to pay off. Although the total closing balance of f1273.42 looks a little disapppointing this is only the figure at the year end and since that date I have banked over f750, bringing the amount in the bank at the moment to just over f2000 — and there is well over f300 to come in from orders recently despatched.

Although the value of the stock looks relatively low at f6396, this value is based on what it cost to produce the books and not on the price they sell at. Even if they were all to be sold through trade outlets, they would bring in rather more than double that amount, while those which are sold directly to members of the public bring in just over treble.

Work on BM49 is well advanced, but this will now be a different publication from the one announced at November's General Meeting as the authors of The Grinton Mines suddenly found a large amount of additional material which they want to check before presenting the final version of their manuscript. The Grinton Mines will therefore be published at a later date and BM49 will now be THE WHARFEDALE MINES by Mike Gill. (I hasten to add that this is not a case of nepotism: Mike's manuscript was the only one I had that could be edited to a publishable standard in the time available to me.)

## Meet Report

NMRS Cornwall Weekend. 9th - 10th April, 1994.

Saturday - Tywarnhale Mine.

A total of 14 NMRS members and 2 guests assembled in the Power House, for a comprehensive introduction to this survey training mine by Rob Smith, who is in charge of the course which is run for students of the Royal School of Mines, every Easter. Due to flooding, access to the mine was via the inclined Railway Shaft on top of the hill. The last ladder led down to Shallow Adit West. The area above this level is stoped out and is supported by some substantial timbers. The ore shoot continued down dip and had been stoped out in the so called Big Stope which led down to Deep Adit via a convenient ropeway.

Deep adit is a coffin level just big enough for one "small" man and a wheelbarrow. After heading back towards the power house for 350 yards progress was halted at John's Shaft by flooding. James's Shaft is next to the Big Stope so after a quick look, it was back up the rope to Shallow Adit West. One ladder length up Railway brought us to Shallow Adit East which led to Gardiner's Shaft. Initially inclined, this straightened out once the balance bob was passed, three ladder lengths from surface.

Tywarnhale remains under threat due to financial constraints, so it may well be concreted by this time next year. If it is not, there is a possibility of repeating this open morning. If members wish to attend perhaps they could let me know before the end of September. I would need at least 10 members to make a viable visit. I would also like some suggestions for other sites to visit preferably inland on Saturday afternoon was blown away, and Cligga Head has now been well and truly done.

Sunday. Cligga Head.

A total of 8 members assembled near the hangars at Perranporth Airfield. A short walk and investigation proved that the upper level was flooded. Fortunately the wind had dropped so a walk to the foot of the cliffs could be contemplated. Everything that could be explored on the lower level was investigated, before the large stope on the right was entered. Half way along a short ladder into another level gives access to the upper level. This comes to day one third of the way up the cliff. After investigating every level a return to the upper flooded level was made. By now members had reduced to three. The flood wasn't too bad, just above the point where my waders leak. It was worth the effort as the

contact shaft was seen for the third time, the top of ore shoots which had been seen from below were investigated and a very substantial grizzly was examined.

## Rhosydd Slate Quarry

Members may know this interesting example of a north Wales Slate mine, high in the Moelwyn mountains above Blaenau Ffestiniog. [There is a straightforward through trip starting along the main level and then working a way up inclines and chambers to appear back at day in a large hole further up on the slopes of Moel yr Hydd. Just the job for a wet day in the hills! A guide to the mine was produced twenty years ago, written by Dr. Michael Lewis and J.H.Denton. This has long been out of print but a facsimile edition has now been published. It is printed on quality gloss art paper with all the original photos, drawings, diagrams and two colour underground plan.

Your Newsletter Editor has a poorly photocopied version of the original and can vouch for the quality of the book. He will certainly be acquiring the reprint in order to see what the photos actually show!

#### Honister Slate

For his third book on Lake District Mining, Ian Tyler visits the wild. upland terrain of slate. At Honister and Yewcrags, swept pitilessly by the "wind in the crack", men moved along airy ledges, on precipitous walkways reaching upwards to the heavens in the quest for the beautiful, silver green Honister slate. Ian traces the 300 year history of Honister slate, introduces the companies, successful and otherwise, which worked the quarries and tells the story of the lives and work of the quarrymen.

Honister Slate is an in depth history of the quarrying and mining of the Honister green slate, and the story of a local community. The book contains approximately 200 pps, over 60 photos, some never before published, several diagrams, plans and illustrations. This has been postponed until November 28th. Dr Marjorie Sweeting will be giving her lecture "From the Yorkshire Dales to China".


#### Course

#### Minewater Pollution.

The National Rivers Authority views the rapid contraction of the British coal industry with great concern as they forsee the problems with minewater pollution which have existed in South Wales for some time being repeated in all other mining areas.

One solution to this growing problem is a wetland treatment system for discharges which is about to be trialled on the River Pelenna, a tributary of the tautological River Afon. The £1M scheme is an attempt to solve the problem of iron deposits which have given the Pelenna the local name of Yellow River.

The system will involve the planting of reed beds over a five year period with the aim of bringing fish and other wildlife back to a 17km stretch of the Afon catchment.

The discharges will be filtered through beds containing certain types of reeds, like common reed mace and bulrushes, which help to remove iron and other metals from the minewater. The reeds will be planted in an enclosed area lined with clay or an artificial membrane and covered with a peat free compost. No machinery will be involved in this "green" process. The impact of the trial will be closely monitored to see whether it will be able to be replicated elsewhere.
